

## How Much Does it Cost to Keep a Horse?

People often say it's not buying a horse that's expensive—it's everything that comes after. From building fences to selecting a truck and trailer, horse ownership is a lifestyle choice for many of us. Estimating an average cost for that lifestyle is a bit tricky, because pricing for major horse care items (such as hay and feed) varies by region. The following is a basic form to help create a horse keeping budget. Please note that our prices are estimates only. We've left a few blank lines for you to add items specific to your horse, such as medications, supplies, or complementary therapies. Fill in your true costs to find how much money it takes to care for your horse each year.
