AUTHOR ADDRESSES BSA NATIONAL MEETING “A NEW GENERATION EMERGES TO LEAD SCOUTING”

ORLANDO, May 22, 2009 – Author Alvin Townley addressed a crowd of nearly 2,000 at the 2009 National Meeting of the Boy Scouts of America this morning. Following a video highlighting Eagle Scouts from his newly-released second book, Townley announced that his generation has come of age, ready to lead the Scouting Movement into a new century.

“Let me say this,” Townley said in his speech. “Scouting’s future is bright, and our generation is ready to carry the torch and do our part.” Wide applause greeted his statement, as it did his closing challenge to “go out there – all generations together – and grow this great Movement.”

Townley’s platform is his new book about Eagle Scouts, *Spirit of Adventure* (Thomas Dunne Books/St. Martin’s Press, May 2009). The book takes readers across the country and around the world as it highlights Eagle Scouts in their 20s and 30s who living great adventures with a higher purpose. It underwent a second printing before it even hit bookshelves.

In the extensive travels he undertook during research, Townley found doctors treating women and children in Afghanistan; a marine biologist studying how climate change affects Pacific coral reefs; Peace Corps volunteers serving in Africa; inner-city teachers tackling the problems of education and poverty; soldiers and pilots serving their country; and an NFL Super Bowl starter devoted to children in need. With these and many other stories, Townley introduces America to its next generation of leaders; a generation answering the challenges outlined by the President.

“*Spirit of Adventure* shows the world how this rising generation is shaping the future in its own distinct way,” said author Alvin Townley, 33. “At home and abroad, we are starting to inherit the reins of leadership and we’re being driven by a sense of purpose to make the world a better place. We face a lot of challenges right now, but these stories point to a new hope and a bright future for America.”

NFL Super Bowl MVP **Peyton Manning** commented, “Like so many of us, these Eagle Scouts are out there pushing limits, exploring new possibilities, and serving other people. *Spirit of Adventure* tells a compelling story about a new generation and America's future.”

Snapshots (*These and others are available for interviews*)

1) Two cousins fled Sudan at age twelve and arrived in a violent Nebraska housing project. “Only three people were brave enough to come into our apartments,” one said. “The police, Jehovah’s

Witnesses, and our Scoutmaster.” Scouting changed their lives forever, and now they are improving life for thousands in their native East Africa by drilling wells that provide villages with clean water.

2) Against all odds, twin brothers from a poor neighborhood became accomplished surgeons, and have since completed two dangerous and independent medical missions into Afghanistan to serve women and children. The pair was supported only by the local militiamen they hired; caves were common operating rooms. Now, local Afghans know them as *doganagy*, or “same face healers.” (Featured on/in: *Oprah*, *CBS Evening News*, *Washington Post*, *Men’s Health*, *Ebony*, and others)

3) An aspiring Scout undertook a service project to earn his Eagle Scout badge, and started the China Care Foundation, which provides medical care and adoption assistance for Chinese orphans. Now, nearly ten years later, this Harvard graduate oversees the foundation’s multi-million dollar budget and has changed the lives of thousands of children. About Eagle Scouts

While *Spirit of Adventure* appeals to a broad audience, it emphasizes young men who attained Eagle Scout, the highest rank in the Boy Scouts of America, which celebrates its Centennial Year during 2009 and 2010. More than 112 million youth have been members since 1910, with 2 million earning the rank of Eagle Scout, including 52,000 in 2008. Only 4% of Scouts attain Eagle. These young men must earn 21 challenging merit badges, advance through a series of ranks, complete a significant service project, and hold positions of leadership. Eagle Scouts comprise 12-15% of classes at our military academies, 9% of the U.S. Senate, and Townley’s research has found them in disproportionately high numbers in numerous positions of leadership and service.
