The members of the Marshall Board of Education are Mr. E. B. More, president; Mr. L. W. Schoeder, secretary; Mrs. L. C. Sherman, treasurer; Mr. Alfred Nagel and Mrs. Blaine Hatch, trustees.

Mr. Nagel was appointed upon the death of Dr. G. B. Gesner, a prominent member for ten years. Mrs. Hatch replaces Mrs. Herman Beuker, who resigned after serving for one year. Both new members are Marshall High School graduates.

Among the most notable works of the School Board are: The sponsoring of such projects as building repairs, book binding and desk refinishing, the sponsoring of a good recreational program for adults and children, and the approved revision of courses of study in both the grades and high school, which gives Marshall a more progressive school program.

Grade teachers, with equivalent qualifications as high school teachers have been placed on the same salary basis. The School Board has given the public a substantial reduction in school operating costs without curtailing the school program. The teachers have been encouraged to attend professional meetings and summer school, for educational advancement. School activities that promote health, character, and citizenship have been encouraged.

The School Board has shown loyalty and support to the school by attending most of the student activities. We sincerely believe they have always been a progressive and fair minded board with the best interests of the school at heart.





Hall of Fame

The faculty committee on honors and awards is pleased to announce its selections for the Hall of Fame of 1936. The five persons chosen for the honor are five seniors who possess excellent school citizenship, high scholarship, and who have distinguished themselves by wide participation and outstanding service to the school in extracurricular activities. In alphabetical listing they are: Maxine Bails, Tommy Brownfield, Milton Eddy, Louise Hubbard and Naomi Reyer.

Maxine Bails achieved unusually wide participation in activities yet was able to garner for herself highest scholastic honors. She participated in girls' athletics, was a member of G. A. A. and became its president during her senior year. In dramatics she was a charter member of Players Club and appeared in its productions as well as in both junior and senior plays. She was extremely active in School Council, was student chairman of the assemblies committee and a study hall monitor. She was also a member of Usher, Science, Commercial and Typing clubs.

Tommy Brownfield distinguished himself particularly in literary and speech activities. An able speaker, he was for two years winner of the sub-district extempore speaking contest and in his junior year won the district contest in the same event. In his sophomore and junior years he was a debater and as a freshman participated in the declamation contest. During his senior year he was editor of the school paper and is editor-in-chief of this yearbook. He played the leading role in the senior play, "Kind Lady," was an honorary member of Players Club and acted for two years as stage manager.

Milton Eddy was active in class affairs and in the affairs of School Council of which he was president his junior year. Under the council he became head of the committee of hall monitors. He was president of his class for two years. He played football for his first three years and became team manager and trainer during his senior year.


Louise Hubbard was president of her class during her junior year. She served as vicepresident of School Council this year and for the past two years was student chairman of the important School Union committee. She was a helpful and cooperative member of several other organizations but will be best remembered for her distinctive participation in dramatics, particularly for her portrayal of Mary Herries in "Kind Lady." In her freshman and sophomore years she was secretary of the School Council and as a junior was vice-president of that organization. She is president of the newly formed Typing Club an officer of G. A. A. and a member of Commercial and Usher clubs.

And the telephone wires were so busily humming,







We bid the Seniors a fond farewell and depart for our homes, looking forward to the coming year.







The Dial Staff

The Dial Staff has completed another successful year, having been piloted over its rocky course by its faculty supervisor, Mr. Donald Horton.

Publication of the first of a series of monthly school papers, called "The Dial," was supervised by Tommy Brownfield, student editor, and his aides, associate editor, Rex Vernier, and business manager, Alice Cortright. This staff also conceived and published a Dial extra to announce the results of the Marshall-Hillsdale football game and of the School Council election. This edition "scooped" the town on both stories and was the first extra ever to be published by a Marshall High School newspaper staff.

Editor Brownfield was then chosen to edit this DIAL YEARBOOK, and Dean Mahrle succeeded him as editor of the school paper, aided by Alice Cortright and Martin Maurer as associate editor and business manager, respectively. Mahrle supervised publication of the final editions of the paper.

During the year, with the cooperation of, and under the auspices of, the School Council, a student handbook, *The Chief*, was compiled by the Dial staff and the council. The handbook staff was headed by Louise Hubbard, Minard Mumaw, and Virginia Wirtz as editor and assistants. This was the first student handbook to be distributed in the high school.

The staff of the DIAL YEARBOOK was headed by Tommy Brownfield, student editor, Martha Katz, his associate, while Verne Salsburg was elected business manager, and Philip Brown was chosen art editor.

Miss Elizabeth Burgett supervised the art work on this yearbook.

Speech Activities

The debate squad this year, consisted of Kenneth Albaugh, Joe Schroeder, Susan Udell, Marcia Udell, Eleanor Rushford, Natalie Oversmith and Mr. Herrick, coach. The question debated on was: Resolved, that the several nations should make government monopolies of the manufacture and sale of all combat instruments of war. In the middle of October the debate season began with several non-decision debates with surrounding cities. In December the team entered the Twin Valley Conference Tournament, held at Albion College, and won three of the four rounds, to tie with Homer for first place. For winning first place the team received a plaque from the Detroit Free Press, and the right to enter the State elimination contest. In the State eliminations the team won its first two debates with Homer and North Adams respectively, but were defeated in the next by Waldron. During the year the team participated in more than forty debates.

In the local oratorical contest the orators were Ruth Meyers and Kenneth Albaugh. Albaugh, with his oration titled "Unfinished Business," won the contest. Four students took part in the declamation contest. The winners were Joe Schroeder and Joyce Marble. In extempore speaking Margaret Waid and Tommy Brownfield took part. Brownfield received first place.

The winners in the local contest represented Marshall in the sub-district contest at Hillsdale on March 26. Brownfield and Schroeder were victorious in extempore speaking and declamation while Albaugh took third with his oration.

All G. A. A. members are required to enter into at least two sports. Junior Play



In their second hattle with Hillsdale the Redskins again defeated them by a 20-13 score. In their game with Sturgis which had to be decided in an overtime period the Marshallites eked out a 26-24 victory. The Redskins traveled to Adrian and lost their previously postponed game by 26-24. The Redskins playing their last Twin Valley Conference game on their home floor defeated Coldwater 30-24.

In the district tournament held at Albion, Marshall defeated Albion, Coldwater and Hillsdale on successive evenings by scores of 27-17, 29-14, and 25-21, respectively, to capture the championship.

In the regional tournament, also held at Albion, Marshall defeated Mason and again Hillsdale, by scores of 23-13 and 22-18 to capture their second successive regional championship.

By winning the regional tournament the Redskins became eligible to enter the quarter finals of the State tournament. In their first round of play Marshall drew Adrian and defeated them 40-29. The next day they journeyed to Grand Rapids and were defeated by Petoskey 29-28 by the point system.

Thus the Redskins ended another grand season winning 12 games and losing only 4.

Intramural Sports were first introduced into the High School during the spring of 1932. Since that time changes and improvements have been made in the regular lineup of activities.


