Marshall won their quarter final game by massacreing Plymouth, 42-24. In the semi-finals the Redskins drew Lapeer, another hitherto undefeated aggregation. The cool, smooth-running Lapeer machine gave the Redskins a terrific battle for three quarters. At the start of the fourth quarter it was still anybody's game, but not for long. The Redskins took to the warpath in earnest and overwhelmed their opponents. The final score was 37-21.

The lone remaining barrier between Marshall and the state championship was St. Theresa of Detroit, the defending champions. The Redsk ins made a valiant attempt to hurdle this final barrier but were unsuccessful.

### BASEBALL

The Junior-Senior game was a see-saw affair; the Juniors winning 29 to 22.


The Sophomore-Junior championship game was by far the best of the three, with Juniors finally edging out Sophomores 15 to 13.


