The Zane Grey Review: This is an introduction to a new publication which is being sent to you in the hope that it will prove valuable in continuing your interest in the Zane Grey's West Society. My goal as editor of this newsletter is to provide information about all the different things that make our organization function. In addition, an open ear will always be had for our readers to make suggestions or ask questions. This letter is not intended to be in competition with any other publication but rather to complement and to fill in information not normally found in magazines. In doing all these things and more, perhaps we can even find some time to have a little fun with it.

3rd Annual Convention: Dr. and Mrs. Loren Grey were special guests at the 3rd annual convention of the Zane Grey's West Society, which met at Zanesville, Ohio, the week of June 2. Dr. Grey, the son of the famous author, addressed the convention on "The Phenomenon of Zane Grey," which included the amazing demand for his work yet today. Dr. Grey openly admitted that it had not been easy growing up with the famous author for a father. He said that he could remember only one time that he and his father had been alone. "I was as severe a critic of my father's work as the Eastern critics. I was jealous of him as a writer," he said. Dr. Grey, the president of Zane Grey Inc., announced plans for a new line of Zane Grey books, video cassettes and his own new book, Zane Grey: A Photographic Odyssey.

The annual book auction was a success. Items donated brought a total of \$3036. Of course, buying and swapping of Zane Grey books and other related items were one of the main events for the collectors throughout the week.

Zane Grey fans also toured the home where Grey was born in 1872. They also visited the Ohio Historical Center in Columbus, for a presentation and exhibit of Zane Grey memorabilia. The group also took an evening cruise on the sternwheeler Lorena on the Muskingum River.

The Organization gave unanimous approval to a constitution and by-laws that called for the election of a board of directors. Elected were Eugene Hafner, president, Timonium, MD.; Clifford Ford, vice-president, West Point, GA.; Don Warren, secretary-treasurer, Sullivan, IL.; Joe L. Wheeler, executive director, Boulder, CO.; G.M. Farley, honorary president, Hagerstown, MD.; and directors Gilbert De Young of South Holland, IL.; Charles Schissel of Amesbury, MA.; Robert Paulson of Mason City, IA.; and James Vickers of Ijamsville, MD. The convention voted to hold next years convention in Arizona, with the exact site to be decided by the convention committee and approved by the Board of Directors.

Membership: Enclosed with the newsletter is a new membership information sheet and also an application for membership. On the information sheet is the information that pertains to the three classes of membership. In addition to this information, though, is the fact that many of our members like to receive more than one copy of our publications, so why not help our organization grow and sign your spouse up as a full fledged member. They can be associate members,

but they can just as easily get all of the privileges. What better buy in this day than a \$25.00 membership. We also now have our first student member. Our grandson, Zachary Sparling, who was the youngest in attendance at Payson and was the only student at Zanesville, became eight years old on July 25, so one of his presents was his first years membership in the Society. Surely across the nation, among our members, is a number of young interested people that can help our Society grow and carry on for us tomorrow. Zach would like to see a group of young people join him in Arizona next June. Starting in our next issue, I will be publishing a list of our new members, so make it tough on me and sign up all you can.

Finances: As we go to press there has not been a complete transfer of the secretary-treasurer office to me, but from all appearances, we will be able to get through to the new membership year. Our membership year now ends on December 31 and by being cost conscious, we will be able to make it. With your help in attracting new members and in a few cases bringing your membership up to date, I am sure we can look forward to many more years as an organization. In addition to this, many may want to pay 1986 dues prior to January 1st and this will help. If someone wants to make a donation, it will always be welcome and I can assure you, put to good use. As of August 1, 1985, we have the following accounting which started when the new books were opened on June 7, 1985.



### Membership Information

The purpose of this organization is to promote interest in and knowledge of the eminent American author, Zane Grey, and his works, to revive interest in the writings of Zane Grey and to preserve the sites of his writings so that future generations may realize the contributions made by Zane Grey toward the development of the adventure story in American literature.

Upon the payment of \$25.00 annual dues to the Society, you will become a regular active member and entitled to the following benefits:

- 1. You will receive at least four issues each year of Zane Grey oriented publications.
- 2. You will receive six issues of the "Zane Grey Review", a newsletter published by the Society. This letter will be oriented toward informing you, the member, about all matters pertaining to the Society, to include finances, membership, meetings of interest and new things happening in the Zane Grey field.
- 3. You will receive a membership card and as a paid up regular active member, you are entitled to vote on all issues and to hold office in the organization.
- 4. You will be notified of and invited to participate in chapter meetings and the annual convention.
- 5. You will be entitled to purchase back issues of the Society publications, to attend and purchase items at the yearly auction, and you will be made aware of books and magazines that contain information on or pertaining to Zane Grey.
