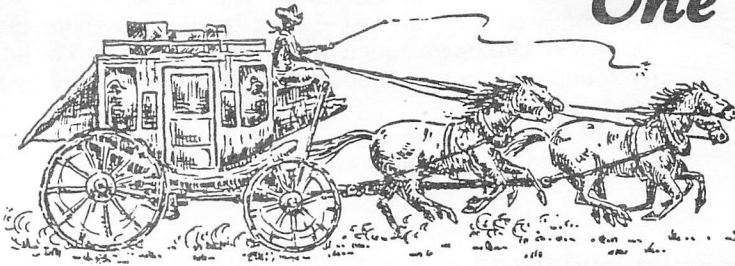

## AGREEMENT REACHED

Dr. Loren Grey, President of Zane Grey, Inc. reached tentative agreement with Dr. Candace Kant to write a book featuring the letters written to each other by his mother and father. Dr. Grey, son of the distinguished author Zane Grey, said he was very impressed with Dr. Kant's book, *ZANE GREY'S ARIZONA* which details the western writer's numerous connections with the Grand Canyon State.

The day before, the first storm of the season dumped 15 inches of snow on Flagstaff, Arizona at an altitude of nearly 7000 feet. In the beautiful Red Rock country of Sedona, not too many miles to the south and at an elevation 2000 feet lower than Flagstaff, the cracks and crevices of the world-famous rock formations were encrusted with a contrast of white decorative artistry.

Also the day before, Dr. Loren Grey and his wife, Bonnie, had driven the last few miles of the 100-mile drive from Phoenix through a thin layer of snow. And Dr. Candace Kant and husband, Jim, intending to drive from their home in Las Vegas, Nevada, to Sedona in one day had their plans dangerously changed. An 18-wheeler jack-knifed in front of them blocking the highway necessitating a detour through Prescott and an unplanned over-night stay short of their destination.

They were to be featured speakers, November 13, at the second annual author's luncheon sponsored by the Sedona-Flagstaff Symphony League at the posh Poco Diablo in Sedona.

Five authors were at the speakers table. The emcee was Dr. Philip Rulon, Director of the "Center for Excellence in Education" at Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff.

First to be introduced was Platt Cline, the retired editor-publisher of the Arizona Daily Sun in Flagstaff. His book, *THEY CAME TO THE MOUNTAIN*, is the finest history of the pioneers of Northern Arizona. A resident of the area since 1938, Cline's book was named the Flagstaff Bicentennial-Centennial Commission's official publication. 1976 was the 100th birthday of Flagstaff (Zane Grey called it Flagerstown) while the United States was celebrating its 200th anniversary.

Lewis De Serio, a transplanted black-and-white photographer from Long Island, N.Y., but now a Sedona resident, explained the purpose and methodology behind his book on southwestern photographs.

Another Sedona resident, Fairlee Cumfield described the research that went into her book on Commuter Marriages.

Then, Dr. Rulon announced what he called "the feature part of the program" centering around the great

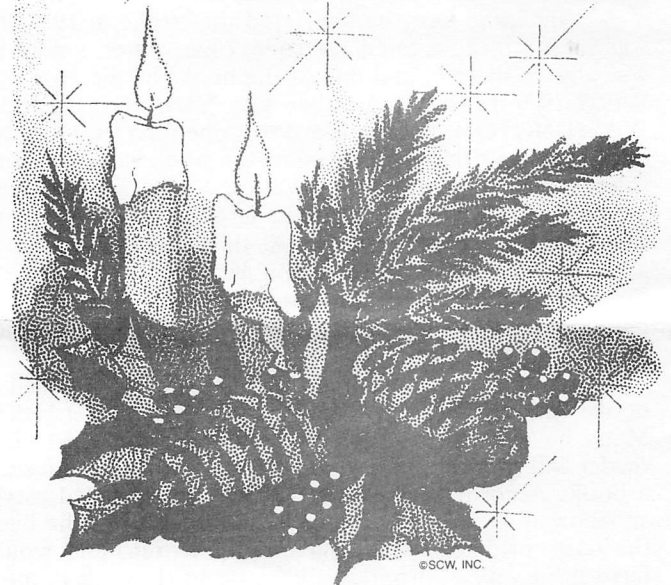
western author, Zane Grey.

He introduced Dr. Kant, whose book *ZANE GREY'S ARIZONA* (Northland Press, Flagstaff) has been widely acclaimed as a significant contribution to the knowledge of Grey's travels and writings about Arizona and his influence on many of the motion pictures made in Arizona during the earlier part of the century.

Dr. Kant, or "Candy" as Dr. Rulon called his former student, told the luncheon attendees that she knew the name Zane Grey but didn't know who or what he was when Dr. Rulon first suggested Grey as the subject of her dissertation for her PhD, and which resulted in her book. But she soon found out who Zane Grey was and "is." She

## THE UNPUBLISHED ZANE GREY STORIES

Zane Grey was a prolific writer. Various estimates, most of them erroneous, as to the number of books he wrote each year state that he wrote four or more books per year. It is certain, however, that he wrote many more books than could be published in his lifetime at the rate Harper and Brothers were releasing them to the public.

The last book published before Zane Grey's death was WESTERN UNION. He spent part of the Saturday before his death autographing copies of this book at Vroman's store in Pasadena. Harpers, at the height of Grey's popularity usually published two books a year, the highest number being four in 1928 which included two novels, a fishing book, and DON. After his death Harpers usually published one book a year. Finally, in 1963, they published BOULDER DAM and wrote "finis" to their connection with Zane Grey—or so they thought. They eventually, in 1977, published THE REEF GIRL after some pressure from the public and the capable editing of Loren Grey.

Other books by Zane Grey have been published. In 1977 Belmont Tower Books published THE WESTERNER, an original paperback. To my knowledge it has never been reprinted in any form. In 1979 they published, in paperback, THE RUSTLERS OF PECOS COUNTY, a revision of the 1914 magazine serialization of THE LONE STAR RANGERS (NOT THE LONE STAR RANGER). Walter J. Black, Inc. published a book of short stories in 1979 entitled THE CAMP ROBBER AND OTHER STORIES. Then, in 1983 Winchester Press published THE UNDISCOVERED ZANE GREY FISHING STORIES. There were also some less serious efforts such as THE TRAIL OF THE JAGUAR, THE LORD OF LACKAWAXEN CREEK, and THE WESTERN MOTION PICTURE, all article reprints. Yet the rumors persist that there are still some unpublished Zane Grey manuscripts. And the rumors are not without substance.

After Zane Grey had suffered the stroke in 1937, he was totally incapacitated for some time. After awhile he was able to dictate, and one of the books he dictated was WESTERN UNION. Another was YOUNG GEORGE WASHINGTON. (I have heard this one referred to under other similar titles). The Washington book was once considered for publication by Walter J. Black, Inc. The manuscript, according to Loren Grey, would need considerable editing and revising. At this time there is not a great deal of hope of it seeing publication.

Grey was also considering a book about Sam Houston tentatively called THE BIG DRUNK. This one did not develop beyond some notes.

In some magazine articles Zane Grey mentioned a book entitled TALES OF MAN-EATING SHARKS. Many have sought for this book. It does not exist. The reader will recall that Grey said he was "working" on such a book. According to Romer Grey all that existed was a shoebox of newspaper clippings and letters. Had he lived the book probably would have been written, and would have been very appropriate, because in those days most arm-chair authorities refused to accept the reports of humans being attacked by sharks.

There is, I think, a possibility of some short unpublished manuscripts by Zane Grey turning up. A few years ago I was in touch with a man who had a very early holograph manuscript by Zane Grey called "The Black Skull," a story of pirates. I lost track of the owner. There are several pages of a manuscript entitled "The Painted Desert," written about a trip with Witherell across this

fascinating stretch of desert. At least half of it, or more, is missing.

I do not anticipate seeing any further Zane Grey books unless someone should publish the fishing stories that appeared after his last fishing book, or perhaps put "Down an Unknown Jungle River" in book form. The latter would make a tremendous book if well illustrated by a good artist.

At this moment it doesn't seem likely that we will see any new books by Zane Grey.

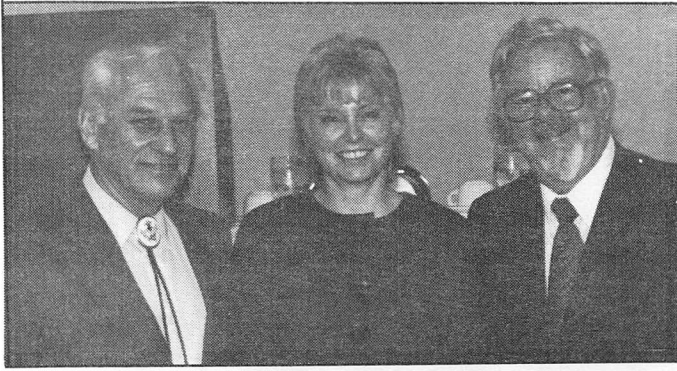

and her husband and two children toured the Tonto Rim country, visited Bill Goettl's renovation of the Zane Grey cabin east of Payson, and talked with anyone and everyone who could shed some light on the famous author. The resulting book has been well-received by ZG fans and southwestern history buffs. Not only does Candy Kant now know WHO Zane Grey is, she also knows WHAT he was to Arizona and WHAT Arizona was to him in his writings.

She also is a recent member of the Zane Grey West Society and plans on attending the Fourth Annual "gathering of the clan" in Flagstaff in early June.

The final speaker was Dr. Grey. His most recent book, *ZANE GREY: A PHOTOGRAPHIC ODYSSEY* (Taylor Publishing, Dallas), was the subject of his talk. He said he chose the picture from literally 20,000 photographs and negatives of, and pertaining to, his famous father. All of the material is "warehoused" at the Zane Grey Inc. headquarters in Woodland Hills, California. He told his listeners that future plans call for publishing more books of never-before published, or publicly seen, photographs. He told of other materials which need to be put into book form, of plans for future video tapes, and other hopes concerning his father's belongings. Dr. Grey told the 216 luncheon attendees that he was very pleased with the treatment Dr. Kant gave to his father's writings and the influence Arizona and Arizonans had on those writings.

Following the luncheon, which was a sell-out, the five authors participated in a book-autographing session, which was termed a success.

That evening, Drs. Grey and Kant began discussions which led to the reaching of a tentative agreement to have Candy Kant assemble a book featuring the never-before published correspondence between Zane and Dolly Grey. Candy, in a subsequent telephone conversation with this reporter said she expects to begin work, on a limited basis, almost immediately, with the full thrust of her efforts starting in June. She currently is an Administrator at Clark County Community College in Las Vegas.

Because of the tremendous number of letters to read and catalog, Dr. Kant said she anticipated it would require a couple of years for her efforts to be finalized.

Dr. Grey's recent visit to Arizona began on Tuesday the 12th of November with an appearance during the Noon News on Channel 10 (KTSP-TV) in Phoenix. Dr. Grey was questioned by (fellow Zane Grey collector) Bill Close regarding the (next day's) Authors Luncheon and about his latest book, *ZANE GREY: A PHOTOGRAPHIC ODYSSEY*. This book will be reviewed in the December 9, 1985 issue of *People Magazine*.

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## **VICKERS SPEAKS**

At the November meeting of the Potomac Corral of "The Westerners", the featured speaker was Dr. James H. Vickers, President of the Northeast Chapter of the Zane Grey Society.

Dr. Vickers spoke on "Zane Grey in the Arizona Strip".

Dr. Vickers has been researching the Arizona Strip area, visiting Indiana traders, historic sites and related locations of Zane Grey's famous novels. Some of Grey's best stories took place in the Arizona Strip, the rough canyon country of northern Arizona and southern Utah. Colored slides of the area, intermixed with old pictures of the historic places compare the present locations with how they were in Zane Grey's time.

After the presentation, Dr. Vickers signed the traditional "buckskin" draped over the podium, covered with signatures of speakers from the past 30 years. Dr. Vickers signed near a former speaker, Senator Barry Goldwater.

The Westerners is a national organization of people with interest in the historic literature and art of the west. Corrals are formed in many of the major cities of the country.

The article by Zack Taylor is fair with the average number of historical errors. Not much is said about Lackawaxen. It is a routine article that could have been better researched.

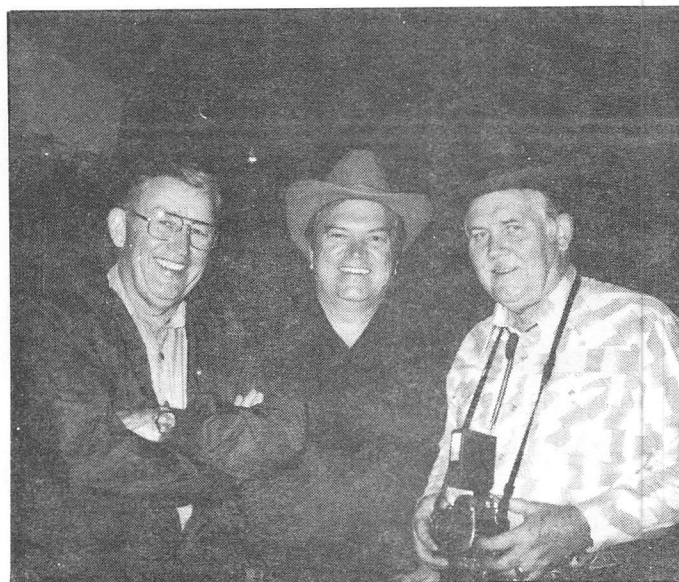

I have been working with the CPA who is in the process of applying for a tax exempt status for the Society. One of the many chores I am doing is making out a budget for next year. I would certainly enjoy having so many new members it would foul up my educated guestimate as to our membership and income. From now on we will be operating on a calendar year for our dues with no reference to volume numbers.
